






Degree Structure

MA Seminar in Literary Studies: The Second Wave of the Native American Renaissance (Schweighauser)

Course description:

Following on the heels of the original wave of the Native American Renaissance (N. Scott Momaday, James Welch, Leslie Marmon Silko, and others), a younger generation of writers found new ways of exploring American Indian pasts and presents. We will read and discuss Louise Erdrich's debut novel and family saga "Love Medicine" (1984, rev. ed. 1993, 2009—see below for the right edition), Linda Hogan's exploration of the infamous Osage murders in the 1920s in her debut novel "Mean Spirit" (1990), and Sherman Alexie's semi-autobiographical young adult novel "The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian" (2007). In discussing "Mean Spirit," we will also watch and talk about Martin Scorsese's film about the Osage murders, "Killers of the Flower Moon" (2023). Along the way, we will consider issues such as the relationship between tradition and modernity, anti-Indigenous violence, humor, and substance abuse. Knowledge of the first-wave of the Native American Renaissance is not required; this is a stand-alone course.

MA Seminar in Linguistics: Intercultural Pragmatics (Debray)

Course description:


In this seminar, we will explore the connection between culture and language through a focus on pragmatics. That means that we will: Investigate how different languages solve pragmatic issues by <u>analysing</u> specific speech acts (for example apologies); Explore patterned language use in specific contexts; and discuss the ways cultural norms underpin the linguistic choices we make. We will then consider the implications of this for intercultural interactions and investigate concepts such as the notion of discursive interculture, and research into lingua franca interactions.

As part of the course, you are required to lead the discussion around one of the papers we read and to carry out a small scale research project investigating intercultural interactions. Given that the Eurovision Song Contest takes place in Basel during this semester, we will take this is an example of an intercultural and multilingual event throughout the course and you are encouraged to carry out your research projects around an ESC theme.

Frequently Asked Questions

When can I start the MA in English?

The MA English can be started both in the fall and the spring term. The registration deadline for the fall term is 30 April, for the spring term 30 November.

How long does it take to study English at the MA level?

The MA is conceived as a two-year course of full-time study. It may, however, be taken part-time. This results in prolonged studies.

With what other MA subjects can the MA English be combined?

In general, the MA English can be combined with any other MA subject offered by the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences and a selection of other subjects from other faculties at the University of Basel.

Which language requirements do I have to fulfill?

A BA in English qualifies you to enroll without any restrictions. Generally, we expect C2 Proficiency.
